The Library's eBooks can be downloaded to your Apple iOS device, Kindle Fire, or Android wherever you have wireless Internet access or here at the Library.

You can also enjoy reading eBooks on any Windows PC, laptop or netbook.



Axis 360 provides patrons with many of the same options available with traditional library use. eBooks can be checked-out, placed on hold, or set aside for future borrowing. With a flexible loan period of up to 14 days, there's no pressure to avoid overdue books - Axis 360 automatically returns your eBooks back to the system when the loan period has expired.







TIP411 is a nationally used public safety tool which allows residents to send anonymous text messages from their cell phones directly to the Hamburg Township Police Department.

To send an anonymous tip from your cell phone to the Hamburg Township Police Department, text the keyword HTPD and your message to 847411 (tip411).

Anonymous messages can also be sent from the Hamburg Township Police Department's web site at <http://www.hamburg.mi.us/police/TIP411.HTML>. The system permits officers to respond and chat with the tipster. TIP411 is a service provided by CitizenObserver, a St. Paul, MN company, which automatically clears all contact information from tips before they are forwarded to the Hamburg Township Police Department. There is no way for officers to obtain any identifying information of a tipster.

TIP411 is NOT a replacement for calling 9-1-1. To report a crime, traffic accident, suspicious activity or to have a Hamburg Township police officer respond to any other call for service, including filing a police report, please call Livingston County Central Dispatch at 9-1-1 or (517) 546-9111.



Charitable Donations in Michigan.

Facts regarding donations. Always check your tax situation with your tax advisor first.

1. The Federal Government still allows you to deduct a donation to a charity or public library if you itemize on Schedule A. See forms and publications at <http://www.irs.gov>
2. Michigan-Public Contribution Credit. See www.michigan.gov for full details. A partial income tax credit maybe claimed for donations to a qualifying Michigan public institution. The credit is based on cash or the value of the items donated. A few examples of gifts that may qualify for credit if given to:
 - Michigan Public Libraries
 - Michigan Historical Museum
 - Michigan Public Broadcasting Stations
 - Michigan Colleges or Universities
3. The nonrefundable tax credit is worth 50% to your public contributions, up to a maximum of \$100 (or \$200 for married filing joint). See Michigan MI-1040 instruction for full details.
