

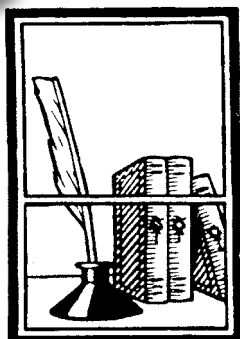

Over 10 local authors will be sharing experiences in writing, publishing, and marketing as they meet and greet the community.

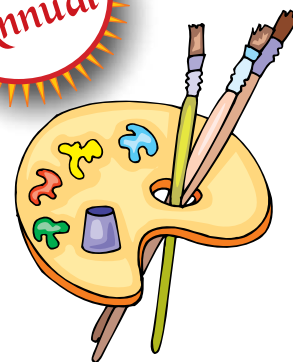
Their books will be available for sale and signing.

Classic titles such as: *The Adventures of Tom Sawyer*, *War and Peace*, *Grimm's Fairy Tales*, and *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* will be appearing in the Library's online catalog in formats that are downloadable to PCs, Kindles, iPads, iPhones, Androids, and other portable devices. New services that have been recently introduced include: an ice skating rink, development of a bluebird trail & bird sanctuary program that runs behind the library and senior/community center, and a volleyball court. A committee will be forming soon to investigate the inclusion of a butterfly and hummingbird garden in and around the bluebird trail and the possibility of a nature trail. 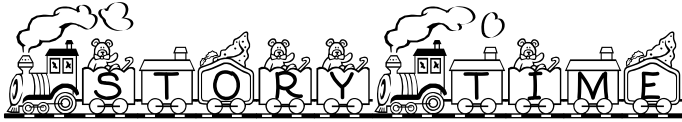

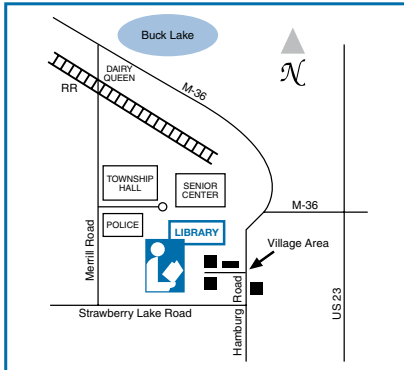
