

Hamburg Township Library's Technology Trek from Past to Present

When I started on the Library Board in the late 1980's, I had just discovered computers as they were being introduced on college campuses. At that point they were primarily used for word processing, spreadsheets, and databases. Hamburg Library's Director, Pat Waters, had a single computer capable only of simple word processing. By August 1995 we had computerized our card catalog, had two second hand computers for the public to use to look up titles, and two computers at the front service desk for staff to use to check materials in and out. It wasn't until 1997 that we had computer stations connected to the Internet. The Library also introduced audiobooks on cassette and movies on VHS. It wasn't long before these materials were reintroduced as CDs and DVDs.

Enter the millennium, 2000. Hamburg citizens passed the bond in February to build the new library and everyone spent the year excitedly watching the building emerge. When we opened in 2001, we were able to meet the increasing need for technological upgrades. This consisted of a mere 18 computers to handle the needs of both staff and patrons, in addition to providing upto-date software for public use. The Library also began offering computer classes for patrons needing basic computer skills.

By 2003 WiFi was installed throughout the building with the addition of four laptop computers to meet the growing demand for computer stations. This enabled patrons to bring their own computers or use the library laptops, reducing the wait for an available station. When the Recession hit hard in Michigan, our services were extended to help patrons who had lost their jobs and were struggling with finances. We began to offer free services (copying, faxing, printing, scanning, Skyping) for job hunters and those collecting unemployment.

By 2010, realizing that the 2001 technology equipment was aging and becoming out of date, but keeping the budget in focus, we worked to secure a Federal grant that provide the library with 12 new computers, four new laptops, upgraded software, two new laser printers, and new photocopier. By 2012, patron demand for e-book service was very strong. After much investigation into this new technology, we were able to bring this service to the patrons while staying within our operating budget. Also in 2012, being ever mindful of future utility costs, we replaced the aging and ailing furnaces with a high efficiency boiler system.

Our latest technological improvement has been to install a traffic monitor to accurately gauge how and when the Library is used by patrons. The collected data will play an important role securing funding that supports your library. Hamburg Library will continue to evaluate and keep up with the latest technology!
