The Hamburg Township community chose to invest in the Library when passing the operating millage in 2016. As that millage comes to a close, we'd like to let you know how your investment has paid off. Overwhelmingly, you shared that you wanted more of what you love: more e-services, more community services, more enrichment, more ways to make your life easier.

MORE E-SERVICES:

Axis360: We have partnered with Pinckney Library to add more eBook and eAudio titles.

PressReader: Offers over 3,000 eMagazines and eNewspapers.

Tutor.com: Online homework assistance.

Ferguson's Career Guidance: All ages can find very useful information and assistance in researching careers and finding jobs.

InfoBase Learning Cloud: Accredited courses for barrier-free professional development.

Ancestry: All ages can enjoy thousands of genealogical documents to help in developing their family tree.

MORE WAYS TO MAKE LIFE EASIER:

Fine Assistance: Fine eliminations for senior residents and 'Read away your Fines' for kids.

Online Registration: Program registration has been streamlined.

Library Floor plan: The library was rearranged to enhance popular materials and create individual study rooms.

Student Library Cards: In partnership with Pinckney Library, all PCS students automatically receive a student card that allows them to use all services at both libraries.

Health and Safety: UV air purifiers were added to the HVAC units. Updates throughout the building and sidewalk to keep in line with new handicap codes.

Tax Savings: Tax payers are saving almost \$8000/year in energy costs after updating the HVAC as well as converting all lighting on the building and grounds to LEDs.

MORE ENRICHMENT:

Library of Things: To support community enrichment, the library now offers binoculars, board games, book club kits, children's learning & activity kits, cookie cutter sets, musical instruments, a projection screen, and a digital camera for check-out.

Literacy Computers: We now have two computers for our younger patrons to help with their literacy skills.

MORE COMMUNITY SERVICES:

Homebound Delivery: Any township resident who can't make it into the library can have the library come to them.

Curbside Service: Available to anyone who would rather not enter the library building; the staff is happy to deliver items to your vehicle.

Virtual programming for all ages: Allows patrons to stay home and stay healthy while still learning and engaging with their neighbors and community.

Drop-in tech and genealogy help: Currently suspended due to Covid, drop-in help sessions have proven to be very popular and will resume soon.

AARP Tax Assistance: Helping at least 180 households a year in preparing and filing their taxes and will resume soon.

WiFi System: Upgraded to reach the library's outdoor facilities.

The library board and staff work diligently every day to fully serve the community while watching millage dollars carefully. We sincerely hope we have provided services to meet your needs.

With the new millage election upon us in August 2022, we will be hosting several Q&A meetings where we hope to see you and hear your ideas. Please watch the library's social media for locations, dates, and times.

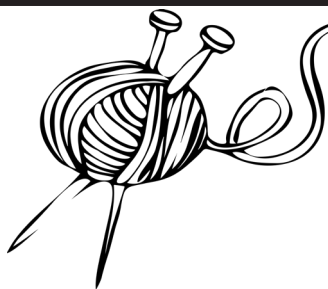

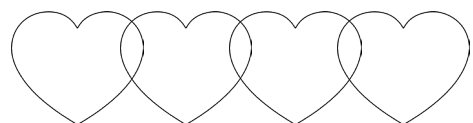

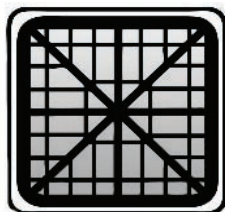

Love Lettering By Kate Clayborn

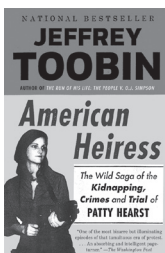

Week of March 21: Macrame Bunnies Just in Time for Spring (\$5/material fee)

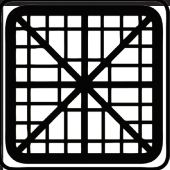
Who can resist a bunny, much less more than one? Enjoy making different size bunny heads for your holiday décor.
