History

Grand River Ave: From Detroit to Lake Michigan Thursday, January 11, 6:30pm (virtual)

Gail Offen & Jon Milan will discuss Grand River Ave. Originally a Native American trail, it has served as a footpath, horse trail, wagon rut, stagecoach route, plank road, and ultimately a two-lane highway that gave some of America's earliest motorists their first taste of long-distance automobile travel.

The Forgotten Iron King: Eber Brock Ward Tuesday, January 23, 6:30pm (virtual)

Eber Brock Ward began his career as a cabin boy, but when he died in 1875 he was the richest man in Michigan. This presentation will look at his vast business empire, the scandals, family squabbles and the national conflict that overshadowed his legacy.

Dr. Ransom's Voyage Around the World That Never Happened

Tuesday, January 30, 6:30pm (virtual)

Dr. W.C. Ransom of New Haven, Michigan concocted a scheme in which he would helm the schooner 'George L. Wrenn' in an around the world trip that would take three years. He enticed investors and crew alike, but when the day came to depart, Dr. Ransom mysteriously disappeared.

Old Chicago Road: US-12 From Detroit to Chicago Thursday, February 8, 6:30pm (virtual)

Gail Offen & Jon Milan will be back to take us through a pictorial history of another iconic Michigan road, US-12, also know as the 'Old Sauk Trail' and the 'Old Chicago Road'.

A Native Voice at the Table: Cora Reynolds Anderson

Thursday, February 22 6:30pm (virtual)

Find out more about Cora Reynolds Anderson. Not only was she the first woman to have served in the Michigan House of Representatives, she was a suffragist, public health advocate, and Ojibwe tribe member.

Body by Fisher Monday, March 4 @ 6:30pm

The Fisher Brothers opened Fisher Body in Detroit in 1908, producing auto bodies for Cadillac, Buick & Ford before GM purchased the company in 1919. Learn more from Bill Pringle of the Detroit Historical Society about the business that evolved into a central pillar of GM.

Hardships & Rewards: Women at Sault Ste. Marie Missions

Monday, March 11 @ 6:30pm (virtual)

The heyday of missions in Sault Ste. Marie was from the 1820s to 1871. Find out about the sixty-nine female missionaries of differing backgrounds who faced similar challenges in their religious and domestic roles.

Josephine Gomon: The Conscience of Detroit Monday, March 18 @ 6:30pm (virtual)

Join Michelle McClellan (U of M Bentley Historical Library) as she discusses Josephine Gomon, who was a social and political activist, mayoral secretary, labor leader, and schoolteacher. She is noted for her contributions to Detroit through city politics, civil service, and activism from the 1920s to her death in 1975.

Born of Hope and Indignation: The Michigan Female College

Tuesday, March 26 @ 6:30pm (virtual)

Find out more about the Michigan Female College, founded in 1855 by Abigail Rogers. By 1867, she had helped educate over 1,000 women who had no previous access to higher education. It was not until 1869 and 1870 that MSU and U of M respectively admitted their first female students.

Discovering Stained Glass of Detroit Monday, April 22 @ 6:30pm

Join historian and author Dale Carlson as he discusses significant stained-glass installations throughout metro Detroit, with a close look at a handful of prominent makers.

Edsel Ford: the Man & the Car Monday, April 29 @ 6:30pm

Edsel Ford was the only son of Henry Ford. In many ways he was the complete opposite of his father, but was very involved in the operations of the auto giant. Learn about his life and contributions, how his name would later grace one of the most infamous lemons, and why the Edsel wasn't all that bad!
